### **PUBLIC POLICY**

AAUW continues its mission to end the horror of human trafficking. The first step on any such admission is to generate awareness. The second is basic BOLO which stands for Be On the Lookout now that you're aware of the problem, you need to know what the signs of human trafficking are. Below are two (2) excerpts from articles by POLARIS and the FBI to help familiarize you with possible signs of human trafficking.

Memorize the signs and keep your eyes and 6<sup>th</sup> sense open wide. Alert the police, FBI, or any other legitimate agency that directly deals with human trafficking. Seeing is believing and believing in your gut feeling can and will save lives.

#### ***From Polaris***

Are you or someone you know being trafficked? Is human trafficking happening in your community? Recognizing potential red flags and knowing the indicators of human trafficking is a key step in identifying more victims and helping them find the assistance they need.

To request help or report suspected human trafficking, call the **National Human Trafficking Resource Center hotline** at 1-888-373-7888. Or text HELP to: BeFree (233733).

Common Work and Living Conditions: The individual(s) in question

- Is not free to leave or come and go as he/she wishes
- Is under 18 and is providing commercial sex acts
- Is in the commercial sex industry and has a pimp / manager
- Is unpaid, paid very little, or paid only through tips
- Works excessively long and/or unusual hours
- Is not allowed breaks or suffers under unusual restrictions at work
- Owes a large debt and is unable to pay it off
- Was recruited through false promises concerning the nature and conditions of his/her work
- High security measures exist in the work and/or living locations (e.g. opaque windows, boarded up windows, bars on windows, barbed wire, security cameras, etc.)

*Poor Mental Health or Abnormal Behavior*

- Is fearful, anxious, depressed, submissive, tense, or nervous/paranoid

- Exhibits unusually fearful or anxious behavior after bringing up law enforcement
  - Avoids eye contact
- Poor Physical Health*
- Lacks health care
  - Appears malnourished
  - Shows signs of physical and/or sexual abuse, physical restraint, confinement, or torture

*Lack of Control*

- Has few or no personal possessions
- Is not in control of his/her own money, no financial records, or bank account
- Is not in control of his/her own identification documents (ID or passport)
- Is not allowed or able to speak for themselves (a third party may insist on being present and/or translating)

*Other*

- Claims of just visiting and inability to clarify where he/she is staying/address
- Lack of knowledge of whereabouts and/or do not know what city he/she is in
- Loss of sense of time
- Has numerous inconsistencies in his/her story

This list is not exhaustive and represents only a selection of possible indicators. Also, the red flags in this list may not be present in all trafficking cases and are not cumulative. Learn more at [www.traffickingresourcecenter.org](http://www.traffickingresourcecenter.org).

From the FBI:

***Human Trafficking Prevention  
Help Us Identify Potential Victims***

For the young Ukrainians, it was a dream come true the promise of well-paying jobs and free room and board in the United States. Once they arrived, however, it quickly turned into a nightmare. They were forced to endure 16-plus hour workdays, usually with no pay. Their living conditions were wretched, with up to 10 workers in often-unfurnished apartments or row houses. And they faced intimidation, threats of physical harm, or actual violence to keep them in line.

Members of the organized criminal enterprise responsible for these workers misery were ultimately identified and charged. But, as we observe National, we're reminded that there are still thousands of victims in the U.S. and millions worldwide being forced into both legal and illegal activities.

**Human trafficking generates billions of dollars of profit each year, making it one of the world's fastest growing criminal activities.** The FBI investigates it as a priority under our civil rights program, but we see human trafficking activities in other investigative areas as well, including organized crime, crimes against children, and gangs.

To address the threat, we work cases with our local, state, federal, and international partners and participate in approximately 70 multi-agency human trafficking task forces. We also offer our counterparts as well as non-governmental organizations, including non-profits' human trafficking awareness training. And to help get a better handle on human trafficking within the U.S., the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting program plans to start collecting human trafficking data from law enforcement in 2013.

**And here's one more thing to consider:** while the majority of human trafficking victims in our investigations are from other countries and may speak little or no English, approximately 33 percent of victims are Americans. They come from a variety of groups that are vulnerable to coercive tactics—like minors, certain immigrant populations, the homeless, substance abusers, the mentally challenged and/or minimally educated, and those who come from cultures that historically distrust law enforcement or who have little or no experience with the legal system.

If you suspect human trafficking activities, do us and the victims a big favor: call the National Human Trafficking Resource Center at 1-888-373-7888.

### **AAUW STATE LOBBY DAY, FEBRUARY 3, 2016**

On Wednesday, February 3, 2016, I had the privilege of attending the AAUW of Virginia State Lobby Day in Richmond with 18 other State members. A kick-off meeting for this exciting day was held with Senator A. Donald McEachin. Senator McEachin has introduced equal pay legislation last year and this year. Then we met with Lieutenant Governor Ralph Northam for a very informative update on current legislation pending in the General Assembly. I visited newly-elected Senator Jeremy McPike and Delegate Richard Anderson's office to drop off AAUW information packets.

We gathered back together as a group and met with Speaker William Howell. High on the agenda was to thank him for his leadership in getting human trafficking legislation passed last year and to discuss the need for additional legislation for victims of human trafficking; thank him for some measures he implemented to make the legislative process more transparent; and to ask for House support on ERA. Then off to meet with Senator John Edwards. Senator Edwards has been a human trafficking legislation champion for victims of human trafficking. This year he has introduced the following bills concerning human trafficking: SB 131, SB 132, SB 133, SB 135, SB 180, and SJ 24, which are all pending in committee. We split into two groups to go to the Senate Gallery and House Gallery, where AAUW members were acknowledged.

We then had lunch at the Tobacco Company for a special lunch to discuss the day's successes.

What an awesome day! Thanks to Leslie Tourigny, Public Policy, VP, for organizing!
