SUCCESS! Conference presenter, Piper, who joined MIT's AAUW student chapter, is in her junior year in aerospace engineering. Her sister, Della, also a SUCCESS! presenter, received a AAUW "gift for a grad" membership from me after she graduated from VCU and a gift membership from the Richmond Branch for state and branch dues; then, inaugurated the SUCCESS! Conference's "little sister" this past June. Their real little sister, Eleanor, who won first place from our Science Fair judging this year won the Blue Ribbon prize for middle school fair, in March. Della just wrote me that, Eleanor went on to the middle school semi-finals with Broadcom International. Eleanor competed as a NATIONAL Finalist in DC on October 29th!!! {Update – "We don't have results from the competition yet, but she presented very well! She's a strong speaker and really knew her stuff :) I'll let you know when I hear more!" from Della this morning.} This is why we need branch members to help us judge the projects at the regional Science Fair! =) Next year, it is March 11th. NORTHERN VIRGINIA DISTRICT MEETING

The Northern District meeting was held October 22 with 51 attendees and all but one branch represented. The program was "Gender Bias in Politics: Is it Real?" The panel was excellent: Melissa Richmond, Vice President of Running Start (which collaborates with AAUW on "Elect Her"), and Melissa Jackowski, formerly AAUW Grass Roots Advocacy manager and now with TargetSmart, which uses data to assist candidates in their campaigns. Both young women are committed to getting more women into politics and have experience in campaigns (both were active in the 2008 campaign, Richmond with Mitt Romney and Jackowski with Joe Biden). They had fascinating insights into gender bias, which often comes from within the woman candidate herself (less confidence in her own skills and self-downplay of her achievements). Encouraging and training young women is crucial.

An interesting theory is that when legislatures reach **30%** female members- that is the point when the universe for women candidates will expand quickly: critical mass. Another interesting fact: due to the extensive use of data, you may see a political ad on your TV and your neighbor may see a different one on the same channel—a factor both horrifying and awesome.

Shout-outs for branches were given for new members (12 for **Reston-Herndon**), filling officer positions (100% for *every branch*), fundraising (\$50,300 grossed at **McLean Area**'s book sale), three new Honorary Life members (*Peggy Stotz*, McLean Area; *Frances Campbell*, Arlington; *Diane Watts*, Mt. Vernon), and special recognition for *Anne Peabody* in the Falls Church Area Branch, who joined AAUW 75 years ago in 1941. Patsy and Sandy presented *Dianne Blais* with her Legacy Circle pin and announced *Marion Stillson* had also recently joined.

STEM UPDATES and NEWS

"INSPIRE Women" Act Passes Senate Committee

The Inspiring the Next Space Pioneers, Innovators, Researchers and Explorers (INSPIRE) Women Act (<u>H.R. 4755</u>) passed the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation on 21 September. The bill, which passed the House of Representatives in March, directs NASA to take steps to encourage women to study STEM fields and submit a plan on how NASA can facilitate and support current and retired astronauts, scientists, engineers, and innovators to engage with K-12 female STEM students. No funding complements the bill that must now be approved by the full Senate before it can be signed into law by the President. {from the Policy Newsletter of the *American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics*}

TITLE IX – Ideas from AAUW

Tired of the election? Take on bullying and harassment with this branch project!

You've probably been following this election closely, and perhaps you even hosted a few voter registration drives. If you're feeling a sense of election fatigue, you're not alone. In what seems like a never-ending campaign, Americans have reported serious stress and anxiety over this election.

If you are feeling election fatigue, there are still ways to stay active with AAUW. Our new Title IX coordinator map makes it easier than ever to be a part of AAUW's historic project to improve gender equity in your local schools.

Why is this project important?

The U.S. Department of Education found that <u>some of the most egregious and harmful Title IX violations</u> occur when schools fail to have a Title IX coordinator or when a Title IX coordinator does not have the training or authority to oversee compliance with Title IX. That's why the Department released a great <u>resource guide</u> for Title IX coordinators to better understand and perform their important job of ensuring that learning environments are free from sex discrimination. By delivering these resources to Title IX coordinators at local schools, AAUW members are helping to ensure we put these materials into the hands of as many coordinators as possible. **How do I participate in this project?**

1. Find your nearest Title IX coordinators. Simply enter your zip code, and the coordinator's name, email address, and phone number will appear.



 Schedule a meeting with the Title IX coordinator. Call or email the coordinator and let them know that you want to deliver the Department of Education's Title IX resources on behalf of AAUW. <u>This makes for a great branch project!</u>
Deliver the resources! Print the <u>resource guide</u> and the <u>letter to Title IX coordinator</u> to bring to your meeting. Bonus step: Don't forget to <u>report how your meeting went</u>! With your help, we can track of how many Title IX coordinators our members have contacted by putting your branch on our delivery map.

Help us fill our map with even more deliveries nationwide. Take part in this important project today – and, of course, don't forget to vote! We have the information for our local schools. Let Susan and Sandy know if you would like to take on this project and work with us to ensure that our students are supported by this important federal program. Thanks!

November Highlights in US Women's History

November 1, 1848 – First medical school for women, the New England Female Medical School, was established

November 8, 1910 – The state of Washington passes a constitutional amendment to guarantee woman suffrage <u>and</u> in 1984 – Dr. Anna L. Fisher, MD, on space shuttle Discovery, becomes the first American mother & third American woman to fly into space

November 11, 1979 – Bethune Museum & Archives opens in Washington D.C. as a center for African-American women's history <u>and</u> in 1993 – The Vietnam Women's Memorial is dedicated in Washington, D.C. – the idea came from a veteran nurse and the memorial designed by a woman, too. November 14, 1889 – Journalist Elizabeth Cochran, aka Nellie Bly, sails around the world in 72 days breaking the fictional Jules Verne's Philleas Fogg's trip, *Around the World in 80 Days, <u>and</u> in* 1903 – The U.S. Women's Trade Union League is established <u>and</u> in 1946 – Emily Greene Balch, co-founder of the Women's International League for Peace & Freedom, is awarded the Nobel Peace Prize

November 28, 1881 – The first organizational meeting is held for the predecessor group to the American Association of University Women (AAUW)

November Birthdays

November 2, 1936 (1999) - Rose Elizabeth Bird, attorney, first woman in California to hold a cabinet position

November 4, 1942–Patricia Era Bath, ophthalmologist and inventor- the Laserphaco Probe, a milestone for laser cataract surgery

November 7, 1909 (1980) – Ruby Hurley, served on the committee that arranged Marian Anderson's performance at the Lincoln Memorial after she was barred from singing at Constitution Hall

November 8, 1897 (1980) – Dorothy Day, social reformer, suffragist and peace activist, co-founded the Catholic Worker movement <u>and</u> 1920 (1998) – Esther Rolle, one of founding members of the renowned Negro Ensemble Company in 1968, actress

November 9, 1918 (1995) – Florence Chadwick, legendary female long distance swimmer, at age 10 swam the 2.5 mile channel at the mouth of San Diego Bay, swimming the English Channel in 1950 she bested the existing record by 71 minutes

November 11, 1744 (1818) – Abigail Adams, politically influential First Lady, early advocate for women's rights <u>and</u> 1914 (1999) – Daisy Lee Bates, mentored and advised the "Little Rock Nine" who integrated the Arkansas, public HS

November 12, 1815 (1902) – Elizabeth Cady Stanton, organized first U.S. women's rights convention in Seneca Falls, NY, in 1848 <u>and</u> 1905 (1979) – Louise Thaden, aviator who worked for Travel Aircraft, soloed in 1927; founded with other competitors, the "Ninety-Nines," which was open to all women with a pilot license

November 15, 1887 (1986) – Georgia O'Keefe, painter known for her oversized, close-up paintings of flowers and landscapes

November 17, 1903 (1977) – Spotted Elk (Molly Alice Nelson Archambaul), international and spellbinding native Penobscot dancer, resisted assimilation while building bridges between cultures, used her knowledge of anthropology in her lecture/dance recitals <u>and</u> **1923 (1988)** – Ruth Bleier, trained in neuroanatomy in 1961, lost hospital privileges when she refused to testify before the House Committee on Un-American Activities, studied differences in brain structure between males and females at the University of Wisconsin

November 18, 1857 (1950) – Rose Knox, co-founded Knox Gelatin Co., revolutionized the company following her husband's death <u>and</u> 1945 (2010) – Wilma Mankiller, first female Chief of the Cherokee Nation, 1985-95

November 19, 1895 (1989) – Louise Dahl-Wolfe, photographer for "Harper's Bazaar", launched the career of 17-year-old actress Lauren Bacall, also worked for "Sports Illustrated" and "Vogue" <u>and</u> **1910 (1993)** – Gladys Hobby, microbiologist whose clinical research and patients with serious infections heralded the introduction of penicillin, sulfa drugs, streptomycin, and other antibiotics

November 20, 1896 (1965) – Rose Pesotta, union organizer and first woman VP of the International Ladies Garment Worker Union <u>and</u> 1910 (1985) – Pauli Murray, civil rights lawyer, Episcopal priest, first black person to earn a doctorate at Yale Law School, 1965 <u>and</u> 1976 – Dominique Dawes, first African-American to win an Olympic individual event medal in 1996, gold medal also in 2012

November 22, 1943 – Billie Jean King, tennis champion, won 20 Wimbledon titles, first female athlete in any sport to earn \$100,000 November 23, 1898 (1980) – Rachel Brown, bacteriologist who found pathogenic fungus responsible for diseases and refined a safe and effective antibiotic for human fungal in 1950, worked with AAUW to widen opportunities for women in science

November 24, 1921 (1992) – Yoshiko Uchida, author of more than 30 books dealing with the Japanese-American experience

November 25, 1900 (1980) – Helen Gahagen Douglas, actress and politician, served as California Congresswoman, when she ran for the Senate- her opponent Richard Nixon claimed she was "pink down to her underwear," which was later termed the worst "red-smear" campaign in American politics November 26, 1792 (1873) – Sarah Grimké, outspoken abolitionist, wrote "Epistle to the Clergy of the Southern States" in 1836 refuting Biblical scripture that justified slavery, wrote "Letters on the Equality of the Sexes, and the Condition of Woman" in 1838

November 26, 1832 (1919) – Mary Walker, women's rights advocate who adopted the "Bloomer" dress reform in 1850s, won the Medal of Honor for services in the Civil War including treating patients in the South, an active suffragist

November 29, 1876 (1977) – Nellie Tayloe Ross, became the first woman governor when her husband died in 1924, championed prohibition and worker's rights, defeated for a full term, Roosevelt appointed her director of the Mint, a position she held for 20 years <u>and</u> 1832 (1888) – Louisa May Alcott, author of Little Women <u>and</u> 1919 (1994) – Pearl Primus, choreographer and dancer who fused modern dance with African dance and created public demand for African American women when she debuted in 1943, her interest in anthropology helped preserve African dance tradition November 30, 1900 (1994) – Mary Lasker, worked with the Birth Control Federation of America in 1939 (which was renamed Planned Parenthood in 1942), lobbied for federal funding for the National Cancer Institute and the National Heart Institute <u>and</u> 1924 (2005) – Shirley Chisholm, first African-American Democratic presidential nominee, received 151 delegate votes at the Democratic Convention in 1972
